Hard to believe it's been (only) a year since the pandemic changed our way of life, and we're all reeling from the loss of more than half a million Americans. School is different. work is different, and small businesses are trying to build back. As more and more of us are able to be vaccinated, there's a hope that we can start having in-person events again sooner rather than later. With that in mind, we're encouraging our supporters to become members of the Monocacy Plowman and Fisherman Club (generally referred to as "Plow-Fish"). For those not familiar, Plow-Fish events are generally held in the homes of local Democrats, where we get to mingle with special guests like Attorney General Brian Frosh, Maryland Democratic Party Chair Yvette Lewis, or Maryland Speaker of the House Adrienne Jones. Depending on the schedule, you may meet members of Congress or gubernatorial candidates as well.

An annual membership for calendar year 2021 permits you and one guest to attend three Plow-Fish events at no further cost. Membership rates are \$150 (or \$140 for monthly sustainers; info on that below). If you do not wish to attend all the events or become a member, a single event-only ticket including you and a guest - is \$75. We expect to hold our first Plow-Fish event this year in June or July,



although it may still be virtual, so please check the Banner and our Facebook page over the next couple of months for more information about this year's membership. We will update the link on our website well before June as well.



We are at the mid-point of session. This has been a very unusual year for a variety of reasons. There are no in-person constituent or stakeholder meetings and events. All committee and caucus meetings are virtual also. Only general voting sessions are on the floor, as mandated by the state constitution, and many precautions are taken.

Since much of our legislative success is dependent on building relationships, it's a real challenge to nurture them virtually. Nevertheless, we have a number of bills that are moving along nicely or still in play.

The ability of pharmacists to administer a greater variety of injections is headed to a floor vote. I am optimistic that Ways and Means will vote an expanded tax credit for organ donation this week. Stakeholders will be finalizing a compromise on the ability to provide greater access to cancer drugs early this week. Progress is occurring from my efforts to obtain more visitation rights in long-term care facilities so that our loved ones can minimize suffering from isolation, loneliness, uncertainty, fear and depression.


As I am reporting positive news, I am delighted to announce the appointment of Kris Fair as my Legislative Director. He has already hit the ground running and learning the process quickly. Many of you know Kris, but you might not be aware of the great extent of his community involvement and service.

Kris is a lifelong Frederick County resident who graduated from Linganore High School in 2002, Frederick Community College in 2008, and Hood College in 2012. Kris has worked on civil rights and other community challenges for the past twenty years. He has been active with organizations including The Frederick Arts Council, The Student Homelessness Initiative Partnership (SHIP), MOM's Demand Action. The Frederick Center, The Golden Mile Alliance, Marylanders for Marriage Equality, The Greater Frederick Advertising Federation, Frederick County Democratic Party, and Weinberg Center for the Arts. In recognition of his strategic planning abilities, leadership skills, and contributions of many volunteer hours, Kris has been honored with the Community Foundation of Frederick County's Wertheimer Award, The Human Relations Commission's Lord Nickens Public Service Award, and Hood College's Thurgood Marshall Civil Rights Award. He has been named the Frederick County Democratic Party volunteer of the year and was recently featured in Frederick Magazine's People to Watch. Kris currently lives in Frederick City with his husband, Dominick.

One of Kris's first projects was to develop a newsletter that provides a comprehensive update of the session's priorities. Happy (almost) Spring, Frederick Democrats!

As I write, we are halfway through our 90-day session in Annapolis and working hard for you and all the people of Maryland. We were able to override several of the governor's vetoes – not the least of which is the Blueprint for Maryland's future. We have also passed over \$1 billion in emergency relief for Maryland residents who have been economically affected by the state of emergency.

While the general assembly is not directly in charge of the day-today operations of government, we have been holding the governor's departments' virtual feet to the fire with the disastrous unemployment insurance and sputtering vaccine distribution. We will continue to call them before our oversight committees and demand accountability. In my own legislative agenda, I have been able to get passed in the House my prescription drug expiration date bill, my insurance subsidies for young Marylanders, and my tax relieve for businesses and individuals economically affected by a state of emergency.

Next Wednesday, HB370 Seizure Safe Schools, is up for an important vote in Ways and Means. Senator Young and I have been working hard in our respective chambers to get this bill enacted into law this year. I'll be looking for a favorable committee report in the next two weeks.

I'm really missing seeing you in Annapolis this session. It's not been the same without you!

The Rest of the Story

It is my observation that those who become involved in politics can be divided into two groups: advocates and political strategists. Most do not exactly fit into either category, but there is a continuum in which people can find themselves. At the extreme, the advocates care much less about the practical way to reach the ideological goal they wish for and care most about their version of reality and the ideal that they aspire be adopted by elected government officials. Extreme advocates often have little tolerance for contrasting points of view and view strategists who settle for half a loaf as sellouts if they are willing to settle for less than the ideal. At the other extreme, the strategists care more about achieving political success and power and are not all obsessed with achieving ideological success, so long as their side prevails. To the strategist, compromise and electoral success are essential to the art of politics. Some call them hacks or operators. Of course, most of those who actively participate in politics are not at either extreme of this continuum.


The perfect blend of the advocate and the strategist is my friend Vinny DeMarco. Vinny is a 63-year-old, Italian-born Maryland advocate and strategist. He graduated from Johns Hopkins University, and after earning a law degree, immediately became involved in Maryland politics. He was elected president of the Young Democrats of Maryland, campaigned for a nuclear freeze, worked in Steve Sachs's 1986 campaign for governor, and worked for Lt. Governor Kathleen Kennedy Townsend.

He is the perfect advocate, but he matches the advocate's zeal and idealism with the practicality of a political operator. In the 1980s, he led the effort in Maryland to ban Saturday Night Specials. For that advocacy he was named the *Baltimore Sun*'s Marylander of the Year in 1988. In the 1990s, he started the effort to for a smoke-free Maryland and initiated the Maryland Children's initiative, which eventually resulted in a 50-cent-perpack increase in the tax on cigarettes, which has led to a significant decrease in smoking in the state.

DeMarco started Maryland Health Care for All at the turn of this century and still is at work advocating for increases in health insurance coverage for all Marylanders. After his encouragement, the Maryland General Assembly passed measures to make Maryland a better place in regard to health care, and Maryland businesses have significantly improved health care benefits for their workers.

In 2010, Michael Pertschuk, former chair of the Federal Trade Commission, wrote The DeMarco Factor, which is subtitled Transforming Public Will Into Political *Power*. In his book. Pertschuk describes the template that Vinny uses to achieve political success: organize a campaign coalition around a goal; open the conversation with a resolution: have a trial run in one session of the legislature; get candidates during the primary and general election to pledge to support the goal; pressure for legislative action; and hold those who oppose the goal to account for their actions or inactions. Each step of the way, DeMarco is a master at public education and media advocacy. Pertschuk describes DeMarco as "an extraordinarily committed person, a very bright person, and one who knows how to get things done." I call him the perfect blend of an advocate and a strategist.

Every time I run into Vinny, I call him "my hero" because he is. Vinny is ever the optimist and always looks to appeal to an elected official's better nature. Every Facebook warrior should read this book and look to Vinny DeMarco for guidance as to how politics really and should work.

Our February 8, 2021, meeting was a joint event with the Women's Democratic League (WDL) on "Moving from Protests to Policy Changes." Protests are the critical first step to making change, but we must follow that with legislative and policy action to make those changes a reality. Our guests were Akiyyah Hall Billups, Director of Frederick March for Justice, and Gayon Sampson, Community Outreach Advisor at Johns Hopkins University. Ms. Billups spoke about how we are a critical time in history, and we must use our voices from the protests of 2020 to make the changes in our community that we need now. Mr. Sampson spoke about how making policy changes can feel long and overwhelming, but we need to be patient and to use all our resources to keep moving forward. Both speakers stressed of importance of not aetting discouraged, since it can feel overwhelming and hopeless at times. We are grateful for leaders like Ms. Billups and Mr. Sampson in our community and their willingness to offer a hand-up to next generation of activists and leaders.

The UDFC Board met on February 3, to discuss our plans for 2021. We have some exciting speakers lined up for future meetings. The schedule will be flexible, but we will strive to maintain a consistent time each month. For our virtual meetings, we have enjoyed partnering with the WDL, the Democratic Central Committee and the Young Democrats for meetings, so we intend to continue this partnership whenever possible. We will continue with virtual meetings for the foreseeable future, since we want everyone to feel safe. The summer picnic (which was cancelled last year), is still part of the discussion, but we are listening to our local leaders and healthcare professionals for guidance.


