South County Dems Hold February Meeting

The South County Dems held their monthly February meeting on Feb. 18 at Bar-T Ranch Mountainside. Our guest speaker was Joan Arnold. Ms. Arnold is a community development leader skilled in engagement, negotiation, and project management with over 20 years of leadership and executive experience in all aspects of affordable housing development in West Chester County, NY.

She presented a documentary entitled "Traces of the Trade: Tales from the Deep North." It followed the story of nine descendants of James DeWolfe, of Bristol, Rhode Island, who ran the largest slave trade in the U.S., as they were seeking to gain understanding of their ancestors' roles in enslaving thousands of Africans in the Caribbean and the United States. The documentary explored their trip from Bristol to Ghana to the Caribbean and back to Bristol as they followed the paths of enslaved Africans before them and emphasized the key role that the North played in furthering slavery, often overlooked. In the process, they gained greater insights into where their family wealth derived and from it their own white privilege which carries forth many generations later. In one especially poignant scene around the dinner table, they discover that all except one had attended Ivy League schools-while not all of those in the film recognized this as a by-product of white privilege, those of us watching certainly did.

The discussion that followed demonstrated our appreciation for the film and our ability to be further enlightened by having viewed it.



The speaker for the meeting will be Ann Ryan, who is leading a newly formed task force to end homelessness and increase affordable housing in Frederick County. Ann is the Director of Family Services for the Housing Authority of the City of Frederick. She has been on the front lines of housing and human services for many years. As the director of a transitional shelter for homeless women in Washington, D.C., the director of Advocates for Homeless Families in Frederick, and her current role with the housing authority, she has seen first-hand the impact of failed policy for those living on the margins. She is grateful to work with other committed and inspired people to build a model in our own community that leaves no one unhoused, uneducated, or unemployed. She holds a master's degree in public policy from Georgetown University.

What Can Dems Do?

Following Ann's presentation and discussion about homelessness, the second part of the March meeting will

turn to a focus on deep canvassing in South County, which consists of two districts. District 2 in southeast Frederick County remains red, although it is increasingly bluer. District 1 in southwest Frederick County has been voting blue, but just by a squeak. The idea of deep canvassing is to reach out to neighborhoods where there may be many underserved potential voters. By listening deeply to their concerns, Dems can more readily meet their slogan of "Dems Deliver," while constituents, if they feel heard, will be more likely to vote blue when the next election season begins.

A number of volunteers are working to identify target neighborhoods and develop survey questions to prepare for springtime canvassing. The more volunteers who join this effort, the more voters can be reached. Others are welcome to work with this group, either to support the South County effort, or to extend it elsewhere in the county. The Rest Of the Story

The Francis Scott Key Hotel, President Biden and recent losses:

...When we held our last Monocacy Plowman-Fisherman event at the old FSK Hotel in December, some people were asking about the history of the FSK Hotel. The hotel opened in January of 1923, replacing the City Hotel which had operated in that location from 1780 until 1918. The hotel, when it opened in 1923, had 205 guest rooms with 150 baths and cost \$1 million to build with 1,200 citizens of Frederick purchasing stock to finance the building. In 1965, the building was sold to Loyola Federal Savings and Loan, with a branch of the bank located on the first floor. Artist R. McGill Mackall was commissioned by the bank to paint a lobby mural depicting the bombardment of Ft. McHenry.

In October of 1972, Norman Todd, the owner of a steel manufacturing firm in Point of Rocks, bought the hotel and made extensive renovations. The advent of malls and chain hotels outside of downtown Frederick led to a decline in business, and in September of 1975, the Homewood Retirement Center of Williamsport purchased the property at public auction for \$360,000 and converted it into a retirement home. In January of 2000, after the building of Homewood at Crumland Farms, Homewood sold the original hotel property for between \$700,000 and \$2 million, and the upper floors were converted into 54 luxury oneand two-bedroom apartments.

The most notable employee of the hotel was chef Ted Semler, who worked there from 1928 until 1975. The hotel was a gathering place for many organizations and wedding receptions, and the dining room was recognized as one of the best places to eat in Frederick. The Frederick Democratic Party held many Jefferson-Jackson Day dinners. When I was the Frederick County coordinator for the re-election campaign of U.S. Senator Joseph D.

Tydings in 1970, our first organization meeting was held at the FSK Hotel.

In 1943, because of travel restrictions associated with the war, major league baseball teams were ordered by Commissioner Landis to find spring training locations north of the Potomac and Ohio Rivers. After first holding their spring training in Wilmington, Delaware, in 1944 and 1945, the Philadelphia Athletics choose to hold spring training in Frederick, Maryland at McCurdy Field, and the FSK Hotel became the team hotel. Since 1944 marked Athletics owner and manager Connie Mack's 50th year in baseball, a special testimonial dinner sponsored by the Frederick Lions Club was held at the FSK hotel. 250 people attended the banquet, and attendance was limited to members of the Frederick Lions, Rotary and Kiwanis clubs. Washington Senators' Manager Ossie Bluege and Hall of Famers "Chief" Bender and Al Simmons attended. The most popular spring training game occurred when the Athletics played the New York Yankees at McCurdy field on April 6, 1944. Frederick businesses and county government offices closed early, and absenteeism increased in the public schools that day. The Athletics beat the mighty Yankees 9-1. The Yankee team stayed at the FSK hotel that night, and a banquet was held to honor the Athletics and the Yankees with Democratic Governor Herbert R. O'Conor in attendance. His support for Ukraine has been unwavering, and his leadership in keeping together the Western alliance has been masterful. While a president cannot take credit for everything that happens in the economy, he usually gets blamed when things go wrong. In the last 6 months annual inflation has fallen to the lowest annual inflation rate in more than a year. The GDP grew at 2.9% last quarter. Real wages are higher than they were seven months ago. 10.5 million new businesses have been created in the last two years. 517,000 new jobs were added in January. The country has the lowest unemployment rate in 50 years. In the next few months, the enormous impact of the bipartisan 2021 Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act will begin to be felt. Keep it up, President Biden!

...It is with great sadness that I report the passing of Phillip Bresee at age 55. Phil left us too soon. He had an impressive career as an advocate for recycling and solid waste management in Frederick County and other locales, but I remember him most as an eager and active Democrat volunteering to assist the Young Democrats of Frederick, the Democratic State Central Committee, and the United Democrats of Frederick County.

We have also lost Pete Callas, Irwin Hoffman, Bob Forder, J. Thomas Benfield, and Kay Sheiss. Callas and Hoffman both had distinguished careers, and both were long-time members of the Maryland House of Delegates from Washington County, Hoffman from 1963 to 1983 and Callas from 1983 to 1994. Both were in their 90s when they died. Bob Forder (89) was a distinguished psychologist and educator, who got a kick out of wearing a sign that read "Sue Hecht's Husband" when he attended events with his wife. Tom Benfield was an active Democratic leader in Point of

Rocks. Kay Sheiss (71), while not identified with politics, was a powerhouse organizer with regard to philanthropic activities including reviving downtown Frederick, the Jeanne Bussard Center, Maryland School for the Deaf Foundation, Federated Charities, Citizens Care and Montevue, the Advocates for the Aging, and the Community Foundation of Frederick.




