In the past few weeks, we co-hosted a Hands Off! protest & march, and a "We the People" People's Party with Rise Up Frederick and Frederick Indivisible Coalition, in response to the continuing power grab and authoritarian actions of the Republican administration. There was a large showing of community members at both. We also recently independently hosted a community town hall - "Reconnecting with America's Values" - moderated by Democratic community activists Teresa Schwab and Tony Soltero, and a sign wave last night in protest of the 100th day of the fascist regime. We are thankful for all who participated in these events.

We are currently planning our next two resistance events, one in June and the other in July, which we'll announce once details are finalized. In between now and then, we'll continue to promote other resistance events hosted by other local or national groups on our social media, and we'll continue to assess when other events/activities are feasible and effective.

Switching gears to other events. There's still time to register for our Democratic Campaign School coming up this Saturday, May 3. As previously mentioned, the school is from 1 PM -3:30 PM, and includes presentations focused on Basics, Fundraising, Messaging, Data Analysis, and Managing Volunteers. The Rest of the Story – Vera Hall, a Trailblazer, Dan Rupli, a fighter for justice, and Frederick City's Allen Merchant

One of the projects that I am working on is a history of the Maryland Democratic Party (MDP) since World War II. I have been interviewing some who have been involved in the MDP in the second half of the Twentieth Century. I was pleased to be able to locate and visit with one of the trailblazers in Maryland politics: former Maryland Democratic Party vice chair and chair, Vera Hall. Vera has not been active in Maryland politics recently, but I was able to visit with her at an assisted living facility in Baltimore this April. Vera got her start in politics in 1970 when her husband, without informing her in advance, brought some local politicians, including State Senator Clarence Blount, to her house, and she prepared breakfast for them. She made an immediate impression on Blount and remained close to him throughout both of their political careers. A Baltimore Sun feature story on her selection as party chair in 1992 quoted Blount: "She has gotten to be quite a savvy politician. She's unquestionably a hard worker. If she takes a job and says she is going to do it - then she does it. And she carries people along with her. If you're lazy, you're not going to make it with her." Vera was appointed to the Democratic

State Central Committee in 1972 by Maryland Governor Marvin Mandel and subsequently elected to the central committee in 1974, the same year that I first was elected to the Frederick County Democratic State Central Committee. We both served on the Executive Committee of the MDP during the 1970s, 1980s, and 1990s.

When I visited with her, not surprisingly, she was watching Senator Cory Booker's record-breaking speech in the U.S. Senate. At 88 and after two strokes, she has not lost her interest in politics. She had recently lost her husband, Lawrence, last November, and I lost my wife in October, so we immediately re-bonded and rekindled our longtime friendship. We talked about our children. She is very proud of her son, who is a retired eye surgeon, and her daughter, who is a Shakespeare professor at Barnard College. Born in North Carolina, Vera was inspired by her grandmother's interest in sewing. Graduating in 1962 from Coppin State College with a degree in fashion design, Vera continues to make guilts that tell stories. Her career in education as a reading teacher in the Baltimore City schools, where she was the first African-American assigned to an allwhite school in Little Italy, led her to become a reading specialist with the Maryland State Department of Education. She served as Maryland's Assistant Superintendent of Schools from 1979-1983. She was a presidential elector for Carter-Mondale in 1980. Morgan State University recognized her skills and hired her to be its legislative liaison from 1983-92. Elective politics followed, as she was elected to the Baltimore City Council in 1987 and 1991, serving during the Mayor Kurt Schmoke administration. After an unsuccessful bid for Baltimore City Council President in 1995, losing to Mary Pat Clarke, she retired from politics. Earlier, she served two terms as vice chair of the MDP. Vera and I worked together in Democratic Party

politics and at numerous Democratic conventions. In 1991, Governor Schaefer, his supporters, and many party activists like myself were behind an attempt to deny the re-election of Schaefer's own hand-picked chair of the MDP Nate Landow. Nate fought back and defeated Vera as he won his attempt at re-election. Later, in 1992, after Landow resigned to raise money for Al Gore, Vera made history as the first African-American female chair of a state political party in the United States. Her selection as party chair was not easy, as some political power brokers, including Governor Schaefer, suggested a co-chairmanship with former Congressman Michael Barnes. At first, she agreed and then decided to run on her own after receiving phone calls from many Democratic women whose message was "don't quit on us." The Executive Committee of the MDP recommended that she be selected as chair by a one vote margin and she was unanimously selected by the Maryland Democratic State Central Committee. She was a special guest at the 6th Monocacy Plowman and Fisherman event in Frederick County in 1992 at the home of Robert and Mary Kay Kresslein. Vera was always a pleasure to work with and a positive force for the values of the Democratic Party. She is truly a trailblazer, and I was so glad to be able to reconnect with her.

Dan Rupli died in March at age 82. He was a man who always stayed true to his principles, even if it made some people uncomfortable. Up until the end, he was fighting for justice, even running a quixotic campaign for Congress in the 3rd congressional district in 2024 at age 81 and receiving 34 votes in the primary (.04%). Born in Chicago and raised in Montgomery County, he earned a law degree from the University of Baltimore Law School. He worked for the Justice Department, where he oversaw voter registration in Mississippi as part of the Voting Rights Act of 1965. Later, he

formed the Organization for Consumer Justice, moved to Burkittsville and was elected its mayor. In 1976, he challenged incumbent Goodloe E. Byron in the primary. He also ran unsuccessfully for Congress in 1978. Not being a successful candidate himself, he worked in the Tom Harkin and John Kerry presidential campaigns and became a good friend of Tom Harkin's. He also worked in Parris Glendening's campaigns for governor and Kweisi Mfume's 2006 U.S. Senate race, where Mfume lost to Ben Cardin. is sister described him as "having a big personality, big, funloving, and energetic. He could assess a political situation and not be a partisan. He could see the situation through the lens of history and his

experience from working on so many campaigns. He came alive when he was working on a cause he believed in. In his career, he remained absolutely committed to his core beliefs in democracy and fairness, never wavering in favor of changing political trends." (from his obituary)

Allen Merchant recently passed away at age 74. After graduating from Frostburg State College, Allen returned to his native Frederick to work at the family business (Blue Ridge News Agency), serve as Mayor Ron Young's administrative assistant, and as a member of the Frederick City Board of Alderman.




